Beto's contributions to the movement include organizing, community led policy that prioritizes environmental justice and community led research amongst many other community engaged initiatives to improve environmental protections and address environmental health inequities. Beto has co-authored multiple academic publications on community based health research, air pollution, data accessibility, community engagement. He also participates in multiple national climate and environmental justice coalitions and advisories. In August 2021 Beto was invited to serve on the EPAs Clean Air Act Advisory Committee, to represent a grassroots frontline perspective.
