Title: Environmental Justice Community Panel

Description:

The climate crisis is real and there are urgent calls globally to take definitive action. Although all are impacted by this crisis, people living in environmental justice (EJ) communities have a disproportionate share of environmental burdens and have long suffered increased health risks from environmental impacts. This presents an opportunity for those at the fence line to utilize science and technology to develop and advocate for policy change addressing environmental injustices.

EJ community members and organizers offer a richly nuanced discussion of structural and environmental racism, and extractive behavior along with strategies for resistance and building power through community engagement.

Beto Lugo Martinez: Co-Executive Director, CleanAirNow



Beto is an environmental justice organizer and co-executive director of CleanAirNow Environmental Justice Organization. Beto serves to raise community voices in the fight against environmental racism and to overcome systemic exclusion of frontline communities from the decision making process. His lived experience, growing up fenceline to a petrochemical facility continues to drive his work at the intersection of climate, environmental justice, and public health.

He is a founding member of the California Environmental Justice Coalition, Co-Founder of La Union Hace La Fuerza a farmworker justice organization and member of national CJ & EJ networks including the EJ Leadership Forum and the National Leadership Advisory Board Member of the Moving Forward Network. Beto's contributions to the movement include organizing, legislation that prioritizes environmental justice and community led research

amongst many other community engaged initiatives that directly influenced state policy.

Beto has co-authored multiple academic publications on community based participatory research, air pollution, data accessibility, community engagement. In August 2021 Beto was invited to serve on the Federal Clean Air Act Advisory Committee, to represent a grassroots frontline perspective. He is also serves in advisory board roles of professional associations and academic institutions, such as (APHA) American Public Health Association Center for Climate, Health and Equity, Children's Environmental Health Sciences Translational Research at USC, Community Engagement Core of the Southern California Environmental Health Sciences Center at USC, Health Effects Institute Environmental Justice Advisory Group and USC MPH Public Health Advisory Board Member for the Trojan Scholars for Advancement in Public Health.


Atenas Mena: Environmental Health Director, CleanAirNow
